ABOUT THE AWARDS

OUTSTANDING ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT MAJOR AWARD

The Outstanding Academic Achievement Major award is given each year to a graduating senior in each major with a 3.5 and above grade point average who has excelled in his or her field of study. Majors with more than 250 students will be granted two awards. The Ramapo Federation of State College Teachers/American Federation of Teachers Local 2274 provides the monetary awards from generous contributions of their union members.

RAMAPO BOOK PRIZE for ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Ramapo Book Prize for Academic Excellence is awarded each year to one continuing student in each school who has exhibited outstanding achievement in his or her field of study. The Ramapo College of New Jersey Office of the Provost provides each student with a gift award.

FACULTY-STUDENT RESEARCH AWARDS

The prestigious Faculty-Student Research Award is given to a team of students or up to two individual students in each of the academic schools who have conducted research in close collaboration with faculty mentors and made a significant contribution to the project. Students will have presented the research at an outside conference presentation or exhibition or submitted it for publication. The Ramapo College of New Jersey Office of the Provost proudly provides each student with a gift award.

CAROL SCHAEFER HUMAN SERVICES AWARD

The Carol Schaefer Human Services Award is given to several graduating students who have demonstrated a strong commitment to working in the human services field and who will be attending graduate school next year. Each recipient receives a generous monetary award graciously provided by the Carol Schaefer/Shepherd Foundation.

SOCIAL WORK STUDENT CONFERENCE SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

The Social Work Student Conference Scholarship Award is given to an undergraduate social work student for the opportunity to attend professional conferences or for a scholarship. An endowment for the Social Work Conference Scholarship generously provides the monetary award.

HERBERT WORTREICH AWARD

2016 Academic Achievement Ceremony BIOGRAPHIES

ANISFIELD SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

The first outstanding student in ACCOUNTING is ANTHONY A. ELLIS.

After completing his Associate degree at Warren County Community College, Anthony transferred to Ramapo to earn his B.S. in Accounting and was recently inducted into Beta Gamma Sigma, the International Business School Honor Society. Eligibility for induction into Beta Gamma Sigma is limited to the top 10 percent of business students attending an AACSB-accredited business school. Anthony is a member of the Ramapo Chapter of Enactus, an international student club whose members apply their business skills to address socially important projects. Anthony worked on an Enactus project team-focused on improving sustainability on the Ramapo campus. After graduation Anthony plans to work in governmental accounting and to one day open his own business.

The second outstanding student in ACCOUNTING is MARISA R. PIWOWARSKI.

In addition to her major in Accounting, Marisa has completed a minor in Literature. She has been inducted into several honor societies including Beta Gamma Sigma, the International Business Honor Society, and Sigma Tau Delta, the International English Honor Society. In 2014, Marisa was invited to attend the New Jersey Society of CPA's Scholars Institute which recognizes the top 100 Accounting students in New Jersey. Marisa has completed an accounting internship with the Traphagen Financial Group, a wealth management firm, and will be taking her CPA exam shortly after graduation before beginning her full-time job with Price Waterhouse Coopers.

The outstanding student in ECONOMICS is VLADISLAV ANANEV.

Vladislav has an amazing and inspiring story. Emigrating from the Republic of Belarus, he began his college career at Rutgers, but struggled as he tried to adapt to his new home in the U.S. Saddled with significant student debt, he then worked three jobs simultaneously in order to afford to return to college. He earned his Associate degree at Bergen Community College and then came to Ramapo to become our highest performing student in Economics. In addition to being inducted into Beta Gamma Sigma and Omicron Delta Epsilon, the International Economics Honor Society, Vladislav has been doing research on the Federal Open Market Committee with Professor Charles Steindel, former Senior Vice President of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York.

The outstanding student in FINANCE is EMMA R. MUNRO.

Emma is completing a dual major in Finance and Music. Dean Perry will describe her impressive accomplishments in Music and Dean Chakrin will elaborate about her extraordinary performance as a finance student. In November 2015, Emma was one of the top five scorers in the Americas Region on the Bloomberg Aptitude Test and was therefore inducted into the Bloomberg Hall of Fame. She has also passed the Level 1 Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) exam. She has been inducted into Beta Gamma Sigma, the International Business Honor Society, and the New Jersey Collegiate Business Administration Association Honor Society – top one percent of all business students in the state. She has completed three internships doing market research and data management for companies in the music industry. Emma's goal is to work in wealth management, helping entertainment artists manage their unique assets and income streams.

As Stephen increased his knowledge and skills in information technology over the past few years, he used that expertise to help others. Demonstrating that same level of commitment to preparing for her professional career, Jenna has completed four separate internships with companies, including two marketing agency firms in New York City and the Warner Music Group. Jenna's future plans include graduate school, employment with a foreign or multinational company and opportunities to volunteer abroad.

The outstanding student in MANAGEMENT is DAVID A. HOWARD.

Before coming to Ramapo College, David attended the New Jersey Institute of Technology in their Architecture and Technology Studies Program. Although he did very well there, he transferred to Ramapo College to pursue a degree in Management. He hopes to make his business career in the automotive industry and has been working for Prestige Mercedes Benz for the past four years. David is a very socially minded individual. He has been a volunteer at the Mahwah Environmental Volunteer Organization for eight straight years, participated in trail building and conservation projects at the New York/New Jersey Trail Conference and he is an Eagle Scout having completed 300 hours of service projects.

The outstanding student in MARKETING is JENNIFER ESPOSITO.

Jennifer is a member of several honor societies including Beta Gamma Sigma, the International Business Honor Society, and the New Jersey Collegiate Business Administration Association Honor Society, which inducts only the top one percent of undergraduate business students from among all public and private business schools in New Jersey. In addition, she has worked for the past five years at Nourison Industries as an eCommerce Coordinator and plans to continue her employment there after graduation while pursuing her graduate education.

The 2016 ASB RAMAPO BOOK PRIZE goes to PRINCEP SHAH.

Princep is an international student from Nepal with a dual major in Finance and Engineering Physics. Princep is arguably the busiest man on campus. He is a member of the International Student Organization and received the Roukema Center's International Spirit Award which recognizes students for their commitment to the International Mission of the College. He is a member of the Student Government Association and was the SGA Senator for the Anisfield School of Business. He currently serves as Treasurer of both the Finance Club and the Global Roadrunner Club. Princep was recently inducted into the New Jersey Collegiate Business Association Honor Society – top one percent of all business students in the state.

The 2016 ASB FACULTY-STUDENT RESEARCH AWARD goes to KEVIN NG.

Kevin is actually a Math major but is also pursuing a minor in Economics in the business school. He has been doing research with Professor of Finance, Jason Hecht, on the impact of technological change on small single-state community banks. More specifically, the study seeks to determine whether these small banks can successfully compete with larger multi-market and internet-based institutions who have embraced mobile and advanced technology banking. The project required extensive statistical analysis. Commenting on Kevin's contributions, Professor Hecht stated that "Kevin required little or no supervision even though he occasionally had to make judgments about data quality issues and perform some complex calculations. To that extent, he combined his signature qualities of attention to detail, insight, and speed that were absolutely crucial for the completion of these studies." Professor Hecht and Kevin are currently coauthoring an article on the results of their study that they expect to submit to the Journal of Economics and Business.

SCHOOL OF CONTEMPORARY ARTS The outstanding student in DIGITAL FILMMAKING is ANTHONY J. SCALIA.

Anthony, who is President of the Ramapo College Film Society, has participated in several film festivals in New Jersey, winning awards for "Best Fiction Film" and "Best Short Documentary." An active learner, Anthony completed two internships, with Z100 radio station and PBS American Masters, and studied abroad in Florence, Italy, in the fall of 2014. Anthony plans to relocate to Los Angeles to pursue film opportunities and to grow his own production company, Sharkbite Productions. He is an avid collector of vinyl recordings and is interested in the history and preservation of film.

The outstanding student in GLOBAL COMMUNICATION AND MEDIA is BRANDON M. MOLINA.

Brandon is a member of the Lambda Pi Eta National Communication Honors Society as well as a Provost's scholar. Additionally, Rebecca worked at the Center for Student Involvement for three years and is the manager of Roadrunner Central. After graduation, she hopes to work in the field of digital media.

Emily has represented Ramapo College over the years in the New Jersey Art Directors Guild's Design Derby, winning the award for "Best Public Information Design" in the 2015 competition. The 2016 CA FACULTY-STUDENT RESEARCH AWARD goes to ROSA E. JAVIER.

Working with Professor Marc Gidal, Rosa researched and interviewed Puerto Rican musicians who participated in improvisation-based musical interactions with a Brazilian woodwind player and New York bassist. Her research complements Professor Gidal's interviews with the musicians, and her ability to speak Spanish, French and Italian has been essential throughout the project. Rosa belongs to the Golden Honor Society and the Italian Club. She has studied abroad twice, in France and in Italy. Additionally Rosa interned at Ultra Music, a house-music label in New York City.
