Proposal for a Minor in Climate Change, Policy and Action Michael R. Edelstein, Convenor

Program Proposal

The Climate Crisis has emerged as perhaps the major global crisis affecting current and future life on earth. Every institution of higher education should be addressing this crisis. But an interdisciplinary institution such as Ramapo should be taking the lead in doing so.

Toward this end, a five-course minor in Climate Change, Policy and Action is proposed. Climate Change has emerged as an existential threat to the health and habitability of the earth, affecting humans and all life on our planet. The resulting Climate Crises can no longer be classified as a future threat---it is very much upon us. With only a decade to address the crisis, we must try to mitigate it to slow it down by reducing the release of greenhouse gasses. But adaptation and resilience are also demanded. There is a fast-emerging interdisciplinary field addressing these challenges that unites the sciences, social sciences and human services with business and diplomacy. And there is a need for graduates with a knowledge of both problem and response to fill emerging positions in business, government and the non-profit-sector and to become thought leaders regarding policy formation and public education. Ramapo College has engaged with this issue for decades, running major conferences and offering courses in multiple programs. It is well positioned to offer a minor program in Climate Change open to students in all majors that will rest on existing courses and primarily on existing sections and faculty.

Program Impact

The proposed minor will benefit Environmental Studies, Sustainability and Environmental Science by creating a larger audience for existing courses. It will place no additional burdens on any program. It may offer the additional benefit of uniting programs around a common interest.

Need and Student Opportunity

The proposed minor is both liberal arts and professional in nature. On one hand, a growing number of advanced degrees have emerged that relate to Climate Change---both at the masters and Ph.D. level. The Climate Crisis is a cross-cutting interdisciplinary topic that has implications for virtually every discipline and field. On the other, the climate crisis has emerged as a necessary applied issue for business, governments and communities to address. There will be a growing need for people with a climate background who have other linked areas of expertise to fill emergent niches in all fields.

Strategic Plan

The proposed minor is very much in line with the innovative, timely and unique curriculum desired under the Strategic Plan. It is a mission-central program in that it is interdisciplinary, global in focus and has experiential components.

Competing Programs

I am unaware of any similar programs within Ramapo's region. We are uniquely prepared to offer such a program given our interdisciplinary blend of science, social science, policy and action.

Anticipated Enrollment

It is anticipated that the minor will attract a dozen students in its first 3 years and then build toward a maximum of forty students. The following analysis supports the feasibility of this projection, drawing on course enrollments, event attendance and student club development:

a. Attendance in the course ENST 240 Climate Change and Society:

Since its introduction in Fall 2019, the demand for the course has forced us to repeatedly discuss whether to add a second section.

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d. A new Chapter of the youth climate organization Sunrise Movement was proposed by Ramapo students in Fall 2020 and received their approval as an organization on April 7. There are already 27 student members.

Additional Resources

As noted, the program relies on existing courses and requires no additional resources to offer with the exception of two topics sections (ENST 390) to be added over time (Topics sections are added periodically in any case). No formal program partnerships are required for this major. Only two courses are listed from outside the Environmental Studies major, and these are not required. Potentially involved or interested faculty have been involved in discussion on the minor and support this application.
