## NOMINATIONS OPEN FOR UNSUNG HEROES IN NEW JERSEY FOR THE RUSS BERRIE AWARD FOR MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Uncommon Acts for the Common Good Earn Everyday Heroes Extraordinary Recognition Deadline for Nominations Is February 23, 2007

MAHWAH, N.J., January 8, 2007 — Nominations for the 2007 Russ Berrie Award for Making a Difference will be accepted by The Russell Berrie Foundation until February 23. New Jerseyans who have made a significant difference in their communities through a heroic effort or a lifetime of service are eligible for cash awards of up to \$50,000.

Established in 1996 by the late Russell Berrie, founder of Russ Berrie and Company, Inc., and Ramapo College of New Jersey, the awards honor "unsung heroes" from throughout the state of New Jersey. Up to 19 individuals will be recognized for making a significant difference to the well-being of their community during the annual spring award ceremony at Ramapo College in Mahwah.

The Russell Berrie Foundation —named in 2001 as the Outstanding Foundation by the Association for Fundraising Professionals (New Jersey Chapter) — will provide monetary awards of up to \$50,000, \$35,000 and \$25,000 as well as runner-up grants of \$2,500 each.

"Through this award, we honor the contributions of people who don't seek recognition for what they do, yet generously give of themselves to make the world a better place," said Angelica Berrie of Englewood, who leads the philanthropic efforts of the Foundation.

## Call for Nominations/ADD ONE

Nominees will be reviewed by an Advisory Board, which is co-chaired by Josh S. Weston, honorary chairman, Automatic Data Processing, Inc., and Dr. Peter P. Mercer, president of Ramapo College of New Jersey. The Board, comprised of eminent New Jersey business leaders and professionals, will evaluate nominations submitted by community groups, houses of worship, educators, representatives of the media and others. Following this evaluation, based on criteria refined by the Board, the group will present the awards at the May ceremony. Among the criteria is the impact the cash award will have on the lives of the heroes themselves.

Last year, the top honorees included a Roselle woman who founded the state's first support organization for Muslim victims of domestic violence; a campus chaplain from Midland Park who enlists the aid of college students to bridge the gap between the First and Third World peoples by living and working with poor farm families in the Dominican Republic, and a Wayne teenager who helped his father pull two children from a burning car following a serious traffic accident.
