Northern New Jersey, along with many communities across the nation has experienced successive waves of Jewish immigration at least since the middle of the 19th century. While a number of Sephardic Jews settled in the state before the revolution, the first major spurt of settlement occurred with the influx of German and other Central European Jews in the 1840s. Joining them from 1880s onward were increasing numbers of Jews from Eastern Europe escaping the persecution in their native countries and seeking a better life.

Beginning with Jews from Germany, the advent of Nazism and fascism in Europe during the 1930s led to the next wave that continued after World War II with the resettlement of survivors of the Holocaust in the late 1940s and 1950s. Following the Israeli War of Independence and the persecution of the Jews in the Middle East, their brethren from places such as Lebanon, Syria, Egypt, and North Africa soon joined them. The most recent wave of Jews has come from the former Soviet Union. It began with the

relaxation of emigration restrictions under communist rule and continued after the dissolution of the Soviet Union in 1993.

The focus the program is the post-war period in which new resettlement and suburbanization coincided to make for new conditions on all sides for adaptation and integration.
