Objective


The intention of this research is to understand how/why the rise in mass shootings is affecting college students psychologically, as well as to identify what measures can be done to curb any feelings of insecurity.

Research suggests that a majority of Ramapo students' feelings of safety are somewhat to significantly affected by the rise in mass shootings.



Methodology

Surveys and interviews were conducted, using a mixed methods approach. The survey was conducted to 50 participants, acquiring quantitative data. **Semi-structured** interviews were conducted to 5 participants, acquiring qualitative data. All participants were between 18-22 years of age

Analysis

- A majority (56%) of students' feelings of safety have been affected by the spike in mass shootings.
- At least 60% of students lack confidence in Public Safety in the event of a campus shooting.
- Proposed solutions include proper
 Public Safety training, shooter drills, and installing shooter proof technology.
- Ramapo students are not only at risk to a shooter, but psychological harm as well.
