  - i. **Please write your name, liaison, and summary points from your report below!**
  - ii. Mihir (Dean of Students): Met with Dean Van Der Wall on February 6th. We spoke about the upcoming Alternate Student Trustee appointment that will be held on April 15th. In addition, the partnership with Valley Medical Group is poised to start in the middle of May and they will be present around campus in the coming months to soft launch the partnership. Spoke on UWill and how while it is not a necessity for

Ramapo, it is crucial for other colleges who may not have alternative resources, so she is very on board supporting UWill funding. Finally, addressed a concern regarding taking summer credits and still walking for graduation in the spring.

- iii. David (ITS): They are changing the phone system, so you no longer have to dial 9911; it'll now be 911. They are having a copier refresh, and there will be two more printers - potentially on the 2nd floor of ASB and the 4th floor of the G wing. They may also have COLOR CAPABLE printers - in Fishbowl, ASB, and the Learning Commons. ITS was told that faculty would now print out scripts and is pushing more faculty to do the same. The H-204 adapters will be checked, and fill out help desk ticket for Pro Tools program. They are also working on removing paper-exclusive classes.
- iv. Uma (CHCS): I met with Megan Johnston on February 9th. We spoke about their upcoming events, such as Therapy Animal Visit dates, our Valentine's tabling event, Intro to Mindfulness Workshop classes registration, the Student Substance Use and Mental Health Survey, National Condom Week tabling, World Sleep Day tabling, and how to order your Roadrunner Ready Kit. We also discussed having a tabling event with SGA in the middle of March since March is Self-Harm Awareness Month, which will include self-harm reduction education, coping skills, and overall self-harm awareness. We plan for the March Self-Harm awareness month tabling to be the week of March 23. The Center for Health and Counseling Services is also requesting to cosponsor with the SGA for their annual Wellness Fair on Wednesday, April 29th, from 12 p.m. - 3 p.m.. We would be looking for volunteers to promote mental health awareness. We will be planning to start the cosponsorship process at the end of March or the beginning of April. We also started planning our next CHCS: "You're Not Alone" social media series video, which will feature the services provided at Ramapo as well as 988.
- v. Peter (CA): I met with Dean Goldstein on February 26th. The first issue we tackled was the bird strikes. Dean Goldstein is interested in helping out and proposes putting a vinyl cutout of a design on the outside of the windows instead of using paint. This way, we can have a multicolored design that students made. He informed me that we have a new vinyl

cutter that students can use, and that this would be a great application for it. The vinyl cutouts are also pretty weather-resistant and can be used for a long time. As for getting them on the outside of the windows, facilities has a cherry picker machine that he's confident students should be able to use as long as they are supervised. The second topic we discussed was the merging of schools and how we are going to disseminate information about that and educate students on how the transition will work. I will advertise that during the Academic Fair this semester and other opportunities as more information is publicized.

- vi. Alessia (Title IX): I met with Kat McGee on February 5th. During our meeting we talked about the new rules going into effect on April 24th 2026 regarding the accessibility of digital course materials, including Canvas, PDFs, Word and Google Docs, Powerpoints, videos, and any other electronic material distributed to students ([new rules](#) and [Guide to ADA Accessibility for Course Materials](#)). They are currently making a Canvas course that would train those enrolled in regards to these changes so if you are interested in being a beta tester please email [kmcgee@ramapo.edu](mailto:kmcgee@ramapo.edu). We also discussed the Healthy Relationship Week tablings and Sexual Assault Awareness Month in April.
- vii. Tyler (HGS) I met with Dean Hagen on February 13th. During our meeting we talked about a potential meeting with Poli Sci students with their new SSHS counterparts. Dean Hagen notified me about an Alumni tabling on March 31 starting at 5 in alumni lounges. HGS's Cahill person Alex Corsillo has left they are looking for a replacement. Dean Hagen and Dean Goldstein are planning a QNA session to discuss the new structures coming next semester.
- viii. Sebastian (Athletics)- In regards to the question about access for the trainers for all Student-Athletes- PerNCAA policies and licensing & certifications for Athletic Trainers, they are only allowed to treat NCAA Varsity Student-Athletes or they can risk losing their license. No clubs including dance, cheer, or ice hockey are allowed to use the trainers. Typically in an emergency for the student body we call 911 and public

safety. Equipment and Maintenance-The school has a preventative maintenance contract with life fitness and addresses broken equipment a few times a year if the budget allows. In the event of noticing a piece of equipment in the bradley center gym being in need of maintenance, or a danger to safety these concerns should be immediately brought to the attentions of the student workers at the desk within the gym, or emailed to

**Abby Shiffler** . The lifting plate will be inspected. The school does not own the equipment, rather it is on a lease. Equipment is replaced every four years and there are enough machines currently that address each part of the body. The fitness center is designed by life fitness and by their standards addresses all needs. A machine purchased for the department's budget would not be covered by the contract with lifefitness and if it were to be damaged would easily be repaired. Essentially not effective. The purchase of a hex trap bar with handles would all depend on the departments budget, but the recommendation will be made to

**Abby Shiffler** . There is no policy in place within the department that prohibits the use of chalk, but it's noted that it leaves a mess in the fitness center and is not easy to clean. Liquid chalk is not prohibited so long as it doesn't leave a mess. The usage is not policed as long as the residue is not left on the equipment or bars. Safety-There are first aid kits around the building but if there are areas that may need more focus then you can email Gina Mayer Costa or the fire marshall who handles that for the building. The aid kit situation brought to my attention is being addressed to Abby Shiffler.

- ix. Gianna (TAS) - I had my liaison meeting with Dean Chan on February 27th. During the meeting we discussed course modifications and many changes that have been suggested and are currently being worked on, such as credit changes and requirements. We also discussed events that are trying to be planned as well as other ideas that came to mind. Dean Chan brought up creating a Student Feedback Group for TAS and spoke about needing students for Admitted Students Day.
- x. Ahmet (Financial Aid)- I met with Mr. Frederick O'Neill, the director of Financial Aid on February 20th. This meeting served mostly as an introduction with one another. Mr. O'Neill was pleased to tell me that there has been no change in federal funding for the past year. With that

being said, a very important date to watch out for is March 15, which is when any updates on federal funding will be made clear. Ramapo College is also on par with all federal and state regulations regarding our budget. I asked Mr. O'Neill about the incoming class, and he showed me that the incoming class usually gets priority for aid. This happens because if no special circumstances (divorce, death in family, loss of job) occur, almost everyone's aid is going to stay stagnant for the four years at all institutions including Ramapo. He wanted to make sure that all students are aware of deadlines for FAFSA, HESAA, etc. Refunds will be given out on a rolling basis starting on the week of our meeting, roughly Feb.13 all the way through the end of the semester. He requested that the SGA help make students aware that SAP is one of the biggest considerations for aid when it comes to returning students, and to make sure you are in SAP, you need to make sure your grades are higher. The SGA can help by making sure students know about resources on campus like tutors and office hours, or maybe even study groups. Also making sure that students are aware of financial aid deadlines.

xi. Leana (Women's Center) -

1. I met with Dr. Megan Williams on February 18th and here are a few of the points we discussed.
2. The WC now has the ability to distribute Plan B, an emergency contraceptive, on campus. For a long time they have provided condoms, pregnancy tests, and menstrual products.
  1. Ramapo has decided to switch the distribution of emergency contraceptives from Health Services to the Women's Center. They're transitioning to partner with Valley Health, which is the reason for this choice as well.
  2. Mini Zines explaining what this service is are provided to provide a more interactive way to educate yourself on emergency contraceptives.
  3. It is important to note that no info is collected if you use this service, the WC is just tracking how many boxes are being provided. No identifying information needed, just come in during open hours. All discrete.

4. Planning for Black Women's History Week, created in 2018 and bridges the gap between February and March, which are the end of black history month and start of women's history month and shows us how black women encompass both identities.
  5. Women's "herstory" month, opening event is March 2nd from 1-2 in alumni. As part of it, they are launching their first collaborative zine project!
  6. Hidden gems Market: Women and qt+ makers market in trustees on March 6th, looking to have doubled their vendors from last year!
- xii. Leana (OVP) -
1. I met with Marie Attis on February 11th and here are a few points we discussed.
  2. There was not a lot happening this month with the OVP, so I am highlighting what has happened this month.
  3. Monday 2/16 they held a "Paint and Reflect" event in the Multicultural Center, where students get to paint a variety of prompts connected to black history. Other prompts were also available about personal topics, such as setting boundaries. Students can pick a prompt and paint whatever comes to mind.
  4. Wednesday 2/18 they held "Healthy Relationships" bingo along with the Women's Center.
  5. The OVP hosts pop-up volunteer events, although the dates are never set in stone. I will make sure to keep an eye out for them.
  6. Marie was unable to meet with me herself, as something came up during our scheduled meeting, but I was able to talk to Gracyn Nutt on her behalf.
  7. There's nothing major coming up in March.
  8. April will be Sexual Assault Awareness Month.
- xiii. Michael (Student Success)- I met with director of student success John Yao on February 13th. This was a short meeting where we met to discuss the possibility of sending out a survey regarding advisement and what platform we would send it out on. Other than him telling me it would be made on google forms, he did not give me much more information or clearance on that and he let me know that he would email me more details

at a later date. As far as projects for student success go, they are tirelessly contributing and working on the CAP and Middle States initiatives that we discussed in general. I have reached out to the Middle States committee through Joe Connell to see if I can be their student representative this semester and he said I can. Although I have class during their meetings he said that I can make it up through attending conferences alongside them. For assistance I will keep you all updated on the survey as I get information and if that comes to fruition help administering the survey and taking it would be appreciated. If you have problems with or know anyone who has had problems with academic advisement, we would love to hear and hopefully solve them.

- xiv. Kristina (OSS): I met with the director of OSS, David Nast, on February 28th. This meeting served as an introductory meeting where he gave me a detailed overview of what the OSS office does and some of the general conflicts that come up. As of right now, the office is working with nearly 800 students, and the number keeps increasing on a steady basis. One thing I found important and would like to assist with in the coming months is, according to Mr. Nast, many students either don't know what the OSS does, or chose to not utilize their services, but there are many more students that would benefit from OSS, so we said we would come back to this in a later meeting. He also brought to my attention two current issues, one with the snow removal and how some of it may sometimes be dumped on the handicapped spots, and that is a large issue because it then defeats the purpose of those spots, making it difficult for those students to get onto campus. He also brought up that a number of the elevators and accessible doors are often not working, also making it difficult for handicapped students to get from place to place.
- xv. Ayden(EOF)- I met with Gabriella Ammiano to discuss upcoming events regarding EOF. The senior retreat took place already this weekend with more details about that coming my next Liaison Meeting. EOF will be celebrating EOF month the whole Month of April! The EOF proclamation will be April 6th and would love the SGA to come and support! OSCHE will be having graduation awards recognizing academic achievement of EOF seniors. The EOF summer program will begin on July 5th and will end August 8th. Applications for SM/SI have officially closed. (Learning

Commons)- I met with Dean Cregan-Keller to discuss initiatives for Student Feedback, Stocking the shelf with snacks for students using the Learning Commons through the WE CARE program.

xvi. Ava (Public Safety and SSHS):

1. SSHS: Dr. Ray and I discussed reorganizing the SSHS lounge by sorting the books, adding shelving, and creating a sign; she said she will follow up with me about moving forward. Regarding the Dean's Advisory Board, the Dean advised waiting until the fall because ongoing reorganization would make implementation confusing. We also discussed hosting a coffee chat and inviting a neuroscience professor along with faculty from political science, law, social work, environmental science, sociology, and psychology. My next steps are to send her more information about the Academic Fair and secure a date for the coffee chat. I will discuss this with the other school senators and Katelyn Haury.
2. PSafe: Jason and I discussed a multitude of things, sorry in advance for the long-winded report. Email me if you have any questions!
  - a. Update on parking violations and how to pay them coming out soon
  - b. Link to register for training course run hide fight on Psafe website. Campus course for active shooter is almost done!!!!
  - c. **Upcoming Lockdown Drill:** The College will be conducting a scheduled lockdown drill this semester on March 30, 2026 to help the community practice emergency response procedures. Additional details will be shared in advance.
  - d. **Critical Incident Training:** The College continues to make Active Shooter/Active Assailant training (Run-Hide-Fight) [training](#) available to all students and employees. If you are interested in this emergency response training, please let us know by completing [this form](#). In addition, please take the time to watch the [Active](#)

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[Shooter Scenario Training Videos](#) that are available on the College's Intranet.

- e. **Rave Guardian App:** A free mobile safety app that allows users to quickly contact Public Safety, submit tips, and request a virtual safety escort. We strongly encourage all community members to [download and activate the free app](#).
- f. **Jason wants us to help inform students about the Public Safety page if they have any questions! It offers campus resources, information about immigration, legal resources, and more!**
- g. Update on Narcan: Narcan is not a public safety program, it is controlled by Environmental Health and Safety. Funding issue as well. Looking into possible solutions. He is passing the concern along.
- h. Here are his responses to concerns I've been told about:
  - i. Birch workers parking: Student center lot is not for student center. It is OSS parking. The campus is compliant with ada rules. There's a percentage of blue marked stalls in each parking area based on the total volume of parking spots in those areas. Food service workers are often driven, as there is an escort service.
  - ii. Fire hydrant placement in the freshmen area - don't get to pick where they are. Done during design phase of a building. Code compliance.
  - iii. Ice: After storms, day time temperature gets above melting point. Takes baselayer of salt with it and then it freezes. Facilities works night and morning. Evaluate ice conditions. Happens every day. . If you observe unsafe conditions, call it in to Public Safety, they will put in a maintenance request. There are buckets of salt in academic lobbies and res hall lobbies. Use it, then wash hands. Some salt we use is treated.

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- iv. Is there any way to help with an engine failure?  
PSafe don't fix cars. Can try to accommodate parking while you sort through it as long as it is reasonable. If you need a tow or mechanic services, they can help accommodate that by ensuring there will be no ticketing. Leaking any fluids or if unsafe, need to have that removed. If it is not removed, PSafe will remove the car, as it is an environmental issue. It will be at the owner's expense. If not a hazard, they can accommodate time to navigate. They now have kits for jumpstarting. Can help you change a tire. Cannot help inflate a tire.
- v. Huge snow piles: limited place to put snow. They stuffed snow in less used lots and closed them off. It takes forever to melt. Waiting for the weather to warm up.
- xvii. Joe - Facilities - Met with Nicole via email last week, heres everything that was covered.
  - 1. **Concern:** Ongoing plumping issues in the village, is there any knowledge or solution?
    - a. **Update:** Plumbing issues are pretty common campus wide during the winter time. One building in the village had a pressure reducing valve fail causing higher pressure toilets when flushing, this was repaired. Plumping issues are prioritized as quickly as possible.
  - 2. **Concern:** Students had questions about the prioritization of work orders. More detailed sense is that some students have had bigger issues and some get responded to quickly and some not as fast.
    - a. **Update:** The work order system prioritizes work orders by different factors. If there is any concern contact the facilities service desk for an update.
  - 3. **Concern:** Fire hydrants are placed in weird spots that would make it hard to get to a fire if there is one. Example is the one by mackin as its street side.
    - a. **Update:** Engineers propose the placement of the fire hydrant and then it is approved by the town. In the case of a fire the sprinkler systems and fire alarms go off to alert any residents. The sprinklers near the fire are heat activated

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around 155 degrees and will automatically go off, which would occur before the use of a fire hydrant is needed.

4. **Concern:** A lot of doors are not working properly around campus, whats the update on those.
  - a. **Update:** Door repairs are contracted out just like the elevators, so parts take a while to come in. Door fixes aere done as soon as possible, but the winter has been hard on the doors around campus.
5. **Concern:** Light by library is out
  - a. **Update:** work order filed
6. **Concern:** a new traffic light was installed at the entrance, why was this the case
  - a. **Update:** Does not know the reasoning, maybe needed another light there
7. **Concern:** Ice removal and snow removal, as well as snow plowing has raised student concerns. Overall request is to see if snow and ice can be removed better on walkways and when plowing if the snow cannot be piled by the exits into the roadways in commuter lot.
  - a. **Update:** With the resources they have they are doing the best they can and are trying to make campus as safe as possible. If there is any hazard please report it to public safety and/or facilities.
8. **Concern:** An emergency facilites request was filed for a toilet issue on a friday evening, but it wasnt attended to til the following monday, is there any reason this occurred or how the emergency response works
  - a. **Update:** It is dependent on who is contacted for the concern. In the evenings a repairer would try to resolve this since they are on site. If the repairer is unable to resolve the issue, they would contact a plumber to come in for an emergency repair.

### xviii. Ismael - ASB

1. I had my meeting with Dean Petkus on February 12th, 2026, we touched upon a few subjects such as:
  - a. Expanding awareness of available student resources
  - b. Strenghtining communication between students, administrations, and faculty
  - c. Increasing engagement with faculty and school leaderships

2. A proposed idea was a coffee chat with the Dean and Faculty which would be targeted to mostly underclassmen such as freshman and sophomores that can meet with the Dean and ASB professors to build relationships and ask questions relative to their field.
3. As mentioned in the academic affairs meeting about the Deans advisory board the ASB has a full fledged advisory board and I believe now we have a full social media team if I am not mistaken,
  - a. The advisory board was already established back in February. It is open for everyone and anyone in the ASB to apply, all you have to do is write a one page statement on why you want to be in the advisory board and like the Dean stated no student is rejected.
4. Scholarships: if students are wondering about the ASB scholarships they're 3 people who they should get in touch with,
  - a. Prestige Scholarships - Contact Professor Root
  - b. College Scholarships - Contact Elizabeth Brand
  - c. Faculty Scholarships - Recommended by faculty and also the Dean gives a personal scholarship.
5. In walking around and meeting with different professors last year, a professor mentioned that we used to organize a Wall Street Trip but was unsuccessful due to students not showing up for the trip or signing up then bailing.
6. The Dean also encourages clubs to collaborate on events to show coordination between clubs within the ASB due to many networking opportunities that could benefit students, as well as showing interest in the WPR (Radio Station) and the Ramapo News Paper which he reads.
  - a. WPR is still pending and for the Ramapo News Paper I just have to clarify on what exactly I will have the ASB students due do to having some interest already within different clubs on going on the newspaper giving their opinions as well as WPR
7. For the textbook donations it's going to be a little bit difficult trying to get books from professors but there is an area in the

basement of the ASB where I think would be a great place to put the book library.

8. For business room booking or tutoring rooms the ASB has no resources to give at the moment to have a dedicated room but the official “Tutoring room” is provided by Beta Alpha Psi Students.
  - a. A small old pavilion room may be booked for businesses to host events but has to go through CSI
- xix. Brandon - Dining Services (Meeting on Thursday February 19th with Robert Kuan)
  1. Proposed ideas: Adding QR code survey for more items in Atrium drinks department. I am currently implementing this and students are able to vote on up to 3 items per month, I know it is not a lot; however there is not much I can do unless I talk to them about the distributor.
  2. Addition of Apple/Google pay – in process and need to discuss with Aydan Reed. Proposed. However will need more debate in order to see that the cost is more beneficial than the possible loss. I see it as a benefit, however I can only do so much as of now.
  3. I have learned that the ways in which I can currently gain money for birch or atrium is very complicated and the budget is very tight, only smaller changes until a larger sum is given to the dining services.
  4. Talks of a renovation to birch are possibly coming soon!
  5. News: Restaurant night - March 6th, doors open at 4:30 PM, swipe plus + \$15. It costs \$30 in flex, ramapo dollars, cash or credit.
  6. Birch fruits + hot food bar is being talked about with the top brass, possibly accessible in smaller amounts until it becomes more common.
